## AIS NEWS

At Monday's AIS Summit Moriya Rufer of RMB Labs, in reference to recent newly announced infestations of zebra mussels in Lakes Sallie and Detroit, answered the question many local residents have asked: What can we Expect? Moriya has been involved with studying lake biology for more than 12 years, and is currently an Aquatic Ecologist for RMB Environmental Laboratories here in Detroit Since 2006 she has also been the Lake Coordinator for the Pelican Group of Lakes Improvement District (PGOLID) which works closely with the Pelican Lake Property Owners Association. In these roles she has been directly involved in the detection of zebra mussels and measurement of their impacts in Pelican Lake and others in the area.

Zebra mussels were found in Pelican Lake in 2009; Moriya believes that they were likely present in the lake one to two years prior to discovery. Two more seasons passed after the initial infestation before zebra mussels became widely noticeable in Pelican. Since that time the populations have grown, and as they have done so, there have been noticeable changes in the lake's clarity and biology. She also has had the opportunity to study the impacts of infestations in other nearby lakes. In Monday's session, attended by about 45, she offered several ideas of what Lake Detroiters and other users of newly infested lakes might anticipate over the next few years.

- It is unlikely that there will be noticeable populations in 2017; in 2018, and especially 2019 the infestations will become obvious. After about five years population increases will level off.
- Because zebra mussels remove algae from the water, it seems likely that Big Detroit will see a significant increase in clarity, especially after several years. Clarity is not so likely to increase in Little Detroit because it is a shallow lake (also clarity is already somewhat higher in Little Detroit).
- Aquatic plants may be found in somewhat deeper waters because increased clarity allows more sunlight penetration.

- Increased clarity may also make game fish more skittish – some have switched to night fishing. Game fish may be slower growing because the plankton they eat will have to compete with zebra mussels for food.
- Along sandy shores, zebra mussels will impose less of a nuisance because they tend to attach to hard surfaces. In sandy beaches, they are sometimes found in "clumps" – attached to each other. They can be removed with a rake in the same way as mystery snails and clam shells.
- On more rocky shorelines, probably including the Sandbar between Little and Big Detroit, zebra mussel populations may prosper; swimmers/waders may need foot protection.
- Boaters will want to remove their boats and lower units of engines completely from the water to protect them from damage – e.g. raise the lifts.
- PVC Irrigation intakes do not seem to be so attractive to zebra mussels – wipe every 2-3 weeks.

There are signs (in Pelican and elsewhere) that after some years of heavy infestation, there is a partial die-off of zebra mussels. This is because they have removed so much of the algae from the water there is not enough to sustain high populations. However, as algae levels rebound as a result of the die-off, so will zebra mussel populations; so it is expected that upon reaching the limits of a lake's zebra mussel carrying capacity, that mussel populations will fluctuate year to year. Also, die-offs may aggravate maintenance issues as dead shells wash ashore.

It is important to keep in mind, according to Moriya, that each lake responds to zebra mussel infestations differently. Also, there are lake-to-lake genetic differences among zebra mussel populations.

Bob Hatlestad, seasonal Melissa resident and former DL resident in his youth, again writes about some little-known events from in and around Shoreham. With help from Rick Lynch, lifetime Shoreham resident, and Hans Borstad, "legal advisor", Bob compiled the following bit of Shoreham history.

# Axel Olson vs. George Pettibone - A Shoreham Legal Classic

As Shoreham residents get younger and the rest of us get older, more and more people ask about the history of the Pettibone Lodge, what it was, where it was exactly, and so on.

Along with the Hotel Shoreham, the Mel Sal club, the Village Store, Olson's Resort and other popular destinations of the time, the Pettibone Lodge was a resort and playground for many vacationers from Fargo and surrounding states.

It was a summer hot spot and the centerpiece of Shoreham in the 20s and 30s...a rip roarin' place to go on a Saturday night. The Lodge had rooms to rent, a bar, a dance hall and all the usual amenities and in all likelihood an occasional fight in the parking lot featuring the locals against the Fargo guys. There was a row of cabins between the back of the lodge and the channel from the Shoreham bridge all the way to Melissa. And, the beach on Melissa was a playground for the Lodge's many guests and featured a big water slide, diving rafts, boats for rent and many other water toys of the time. The Lodge and it's cabins and parking lot occupied most of the land between the Shoreham Chapel and the Pelican River commonly referred to locally as "the channel".

In the 20's, a real estate dispute developed between Axel Olson (father of Lois Lynch and grandfather of Tom and Rick Lynch who are known to most Shoreham residents) and George Pettibone. Olson's Resort abutted the Pettibone Lodge property and they were competitors and apparently not on good terms with each other. At some point in the mid 20's Olson, probably tired of battling with Pettibone, decided to sell his resort. Pettibone had been interested in the Olson property for several years but because of the feud between the two of them, Olson would not sell to Pettibone.

Olson hired a Fargo Realtor to sell his resort and the Realtor produced a buyer who, unknown to Olson, had arranged (with help from said Realtor) to transfer his interest to Pettibone. It was clear at the time that Olson would not have sold his resort to Pettibone. Olson found out about the sale to what is known as a "straw buyer" and sued to have his sale to the straw buyer rescinded and to take his resort back.

The Becker County District Court ruled in favor of Olson, and Pettibone appealed to the Minnesota Supreme Court. On October 1, 1926, the Court affirmed the District Court's ruling in favor of Olson. The Court, in essence, held that this was a case of "double agency" and that Olson "did not know" that the Realtor was also working behind his back for Pettibone and that a person "cannot serve two masters, having opposing interests in a transaction."

We can assume that the Realtor had to give back Olson's commission and that Pettibone, the straw buyer, and the Realtor all had to live with the loss while they went off to lick their wounds.

So there you have it. It is said among the old timers in Shoreham that Pettibone's ghost still plies the Pelican River between the bridge and Melissa bemoaning his defeat in the Minnesota Supreme Court.

## MULTIPLE OWNER PROPERTIES, MULTIPLE OCCUPANTS

# and MULTIPLE PROPERTY OWNERS

Some lake properties are OWNED by multiple people - **MULTIPLE OWNER PROPERTIES**.

Some own multiple properties - MULTIPLE PROPERTY OWNERS.

Many properties are owned by one family but frequently have others staying in the property, at least some of the time - **MULTIPLE OCCUPANTS**.

In the MelSal Data Base, we ask that single-owner cabins list names of "others" who frequently stay their (e.g., children, relatives) as "Other Contacts in Cabin".

### For properties with MULTIPLE OWNERS, there is a choice:

- (1) List property under ONE owner with related data (*e.g.*, cell phones, winter address) for that one owner. If desired, additional owner names can be listed under the name of one owner . . . or
- (2) Each of the property owners is listed separately, with related data (*e.g.*, cell phones, winter address) listed separately for that owner. In that case, *EACH owner must submit a completed Contact Information Sheet* (copy included in this newsletter). Therefore, each owner's Contact Info (for example, cell phones and winter addresses) can be listed is our directory.

ONLY one dues payment is necessary for each property. Therefore, cabins with multiple owners need pay only ONE membership annually.

If a person owns **Multiple Properties**, then that person must pay annual dues for **EACH** property.

Regardless of your listing preference, you can include multiple email addresses on your Contact Information Sheet.

Please check your emails frequently. If your emails bounce back to us twice for any reason, your email listing will be removed from our distribution list. Check to be sure our emails are not directed to your "JUNK" mailboxes and that your email box is not "FULL".
