## **An Amazing Winter Wonderland**

As we all know, many property owners on Lake Melissa and Sallie have homes or cabins that are used seasonally – opened in the spring and closed in the fall – and many of those folks rarely make a trip to the lakes during the cold, stark winter months. And, while the warmth, beauty and fun of summer lake life is surely something we all cherish, those of us lucky enough to live here year-round also know that we live in an amazing winter wonderland. Snow and the occasional hoarfrost transform this glorious summer playground into one of the most beautiful winter recreational areas in the country.

Perhaps the most well-known and often discussed winter pastimes are snowmobiling and ice fishing. There are hundreds of miles of marked snowmobile trails around the Detroit Lakes area, and you're likely to see sled tracks in just about every ditch, roadside and farm field in the region. Villages of ice fishing houses pop up on most area lakes as soon as the ice is thick enough to support the weight of vehicles, and colorful portable shelters appear nearly every weekend. It's also quite common to see folks skating on homemade lake or pond ice patches or playing hockey in well maintained outdoor hockey rinks.

But our immediate lake area also offers many additional fun, exhilarating and beautiful wintertime recreational opportunities.

Five years ago, the Detroit Mountain Recreational Area reopened after being closed for a decade. Featuring a newly constructed full-service lodge that houses a café, saloon, and rental ski equipment area, along with occasional live music, the mountain offers two triple chairlifts, two high-speed tow ropes and two "Magic Carpet" lifts that service downhill Alpine skiing and snowboarding slopes including beginner "Bunny Hills" and the SCHEELS terrain park. There also is a tubing park and nearly 10 kilometers (about 6 miles) of groomed Nordic ski, snowshoeing and fat tire bike trails. Lessons and rental equipment are available for all mountain sports and all skill levels, and the staff at DMRA is extremely well trained, knowledgeable, courteous

and fun. A few weeks ago, on Sunday, January 6th, a record 2,200 plus folks participated in the various activities offered at DMRA.



But, right in our own "backyard" on the East shore of Lake Sallie, is one of the best kept secrets in lakes country: Dunton Locks County Park. While many Melissa-Sallie residents are familiar with the mechanical boat tram that transports boats, personal watercraft and pontoons between Muskrat Lake and Lake Sallie, allowing boat travel from Detroit Lakes to Shoreham, the 53-acre park also features two picnic shelters, hiking & mountain biking trails, a paved recreation trail, interpretive history signs and two fishing piers. But in the winter, the 6.1 kilometers of hiking and biking trails offer a heavily wooded (thus somewhat wind protected) haven for Nordic Skiing, snowshoeing, winter hiking and sightseeing.

"the northern trails (of the park) wind through hardwood forested hills once a gathering spot for the Sioux Indians. Remnants of Indian burial mounds are still present throughout the park. In fact, much of the park area was a gathering area for netting tulabies, camping, and trading. The southern trails also wind through rolling, wooded terrain, however much of the trails are located on private land owned by the Soo Pass Ranch". That area is the Lake Sallie Campground used for camping during WE Fest. If


you cross the main entrance to the campground (West of Highway 59) and travel further South into the camping areas, you can easily add an additional 2 plus miles to a wonderful winter trail trek.



The South trail, accessible via a scenic bridge near the tram track, crosses over the Pelican River, which remains open and flows between Muskrat Lake and Lake Sallie all winter. It's not uncommon to see ducks, geese and swans paddling in the open water, and you're also likely to see deer, fox and rabbits along the wooded trails.

Unlike the Detroit Mountain or Mountain View Recreation Area trails (another park maintained by Becker County located along Tower Road, North of Detroit Lakes) the Dunton Locks trails are not groomed, but they are well marked, and typically within hours of a snowfall, the trails are in use and easy to follow. Dogs are allowed on the Dunton Locks trails, while snowmobiles and other motorized vehicles are restricted in the main park area. You may however encounter snowmobiles in the WE Fest camping area or along the Pelican River trail between Muskrat and Detroit Lakes.





The Dunton Locks parking area is usually plowed shortly after a snowfall, and there's even a wellmaintained porta-potty for winter use.

The Dunton Locks winter trails previously were used as a training area for the Detroit Lakes High School Nordic Ski Team, but they now train elsewhere, so as a winter recreational area, this is a non-congested, quiet, beautiful and picturesque winter paradise.



Getting outdoors and enjoying activities in the winter truly does make the cold months fly by, and the physical and mental health benefits are many. So, love the lakes year-round

## **Becker County Coalition of Lakes Association (BCCOLA) 2018 Report:**

BCCOLA offered many opportunities for members to attend numerous events, across the state, which focused on the control and management of AIS across the state and nation, maintaining water quality in our lakes, the effect of AIS on the native fish in MN, Becker County Zoning and Ordinance issues, and other interesting topics affecting our valuable water resources. Examples of some events attended include:

- The June 2018 Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) Summit held in DL.
- The 2018 spring Minneapolis AIS Summit
- Several MN COLA meetings
- The fall MAISRC Showcase held in St. Paul
- Starry Trek

BCCOLA is partnering with surrounding organizations, including local schools, Ottertail County COLA, Hubbard County COLA, The Pelican River Watershed District, and Becker County Soil & Water Conservation District, to work on projects that will educate adults and children on the importance of knowledge and involvement with issues surrounding our water resources.

We continue to work on the BCCOLA website which we hope to have "live" by the end of this April. This website will be a valuable resource for members and our individual lake associations. We also hope that we will be able to communicate better with our total membership, so that others will have the opportunity to be educated on the issues surrounding our MN lakes and rivers.

BCCOLA was an active participant in the planning and success of Becker County's first Aqua Chautaqua, Festival held on August 9<sup>th</sup> at the Dunton Locks County Park. An Aqua Chautaqua incorporates science, arts, and history in creative ways to engage participants to learn, share, protect, and appreciate our water resources.

Karl Koenig, from Becker County Soil & Water Conservation District, provided the following report regarding AIS inspections on our two lakes.

"The 2017 Becker County AIS Plan allocated 751.88 inspection hours and 900 decontamination hours to Lake Melissa, and 751.88 inspection hours to Lake Sallie, for a total of 2403.76 inspection hours. In 2018, 1081.5 hours were completed at Lake Sallie and 1312.25 hours were completed at Melissa, for a

total of 2393.75 hours. The inspection season began on 5/12/18 and was completed on 9/30/18. The final report is located on our Mel/Sal website, which includes a breakdown of entering inspection results, activities completed in 2018 and plans for 2019.

For 2019, a total of 2310 inspection hours are allocated for Sallie and Melissa Lakes. This will provide enough hours to have decontamination services available at each access from fishing opener through early fall.

Lake associations have been very helpful with recruiting paid inspectors. This is a good opportunity for college students/anyone who are willing and able to work outdoors on summer weekends. We will be hiring around 35 inspectors for the 2019 season. For more information about these positions, please contact Karl Koenig at kikoeni@co.becker.mn.us."

A copy of an AIS Identification Guide handbook was made available for each Lake Association. COLA purchased 30 books, with each Association to receive one copy. 
