President's Winter Letter

Dear Members,

Folks it is cold, lots of ice on the lakes, lots of snow on the ground and on the lakes, and all of this is good if it helps prevent the drought of last Summer from reoccurring. Detroit Lakes is actively cutting ice for the largest Ice Palace they have ever built. Lighting will be on 11 February at 7:00pm on the beach next to the Pavilion. Polar Fest events are scheduled from 5 February to 27 February, check out the events at Polar Fest Detroit Lakes. All of this is needed given the extended pandemic we have been suffering through. I have personally known 24 people who have had COVID 19 and two of whom died from it. Please be careful, get vaccinated, and wear an appropriate mask when you feel you should.

As we look forward to Summer, I want to remind you of some of the events we can look forward to. First, the Beach Captain's Meeting normally held the second Saturday of June will happen on a Saturday after the Annual Meeting, more info to follow. The Annual Meeting will be held the third Saturday of June as usual at the Shoreham Chapel, coffee and goodies at 9:30am and the meeting promptly at 10:00am. We will have the Annual 4th of July Boat Parade, one of the highlights of our season. This year we hopefully will have our Home Tour which was postponed last year. I want to commend all of you who contributed money to our Becker County Food Pantry Drive over Labor Day Weekend. Last year your generosity provided \$7,000.

We will continue to work closely with the DNR, the Becker County Soil & Water Conservation District, the Becker County Coalition of Lakes Association, and the Pelican River Watershed District to ensure that our lakes get all the attention they deserve. We are very fortunate to have such supportive organizations working with us to maintain the quality of our lakes and their accessibility.

At the last Annual Meeting the issue of large tent covers for boats and pontoons was raised and it became a very emotion filled discussion. In July I sent out a letter saying incorrectly that there was no guidance from the County on this issue but I have subsequently discovered that there is guidance and it is explicit.

LMSA News

In an email to one of our members from a member of the Becker County Planning and Zoning Department, the following was provided: The Becker County Zoning Ordinance does regulate the placement of docks from side property lines and the required setback is the same as a structure. Table 5-4 from the Becker County Zoning Ordinance lists the minimum side yard setbacks for structures. A ten-foot side yard setback is standard in both residential and general agriculture zones. Becker County Zoning Ordinance, Chapter 5, Section 2 sub part I, Docks and Piers: Docks and piers shall be exempt from the setbacks for shoreline areas except that any projection into the water shall maintain a minimum side yard setback equal to that required in the applicable zoning district and shall be parallel with an extension into the water of the side yard lot line. So if the lot width is greater than 100ft the setback must be 10ft. If the lot is less than 100ft then the setback is 10% of the lots width-no less than If you have any questions about this, please call the Becker County Planning and Zoning Department at 218-846-7314, or contact Joseph Doll, Zoning Technician joseph.doll@co.becker.mn.us. The County will send out a technician to walk the property and verify that the Tent Cover is at the proper setback. Clearly, we would hope that neighbors would take their neighbor's concerns and views into consideration when placing docks, lifts, tent covers, and water equipment. We all want to enjoy the lake and build great memories for our families. Please give these concerns your consideration.

Association secretary, Mary Rotter and president, Mike Becraft made the presentation to the food pantry executive director, Brad Carlson (center) October 12, 2021. In the past, LMSA members shared canned goods as well as money but when word spread that \$1 could purchase at least \$8 worth of goods, the drive focused on cash. For instance, Carlson said the price of one jar of peanut butter in the store could pay for 17 similar jars through bulk buying. The food pantry is located adjacent to the fairgrounds in Detroit Lakes and is open to Becker County residents the second Tuesday and Thursday of each month. Evening arrangements can be made by calling Carlson and his volunteer staff at the food pantry.

MN DNR Seeks Input on Future

Dear Friend,

Over the last decade there has been a well-documented increase in use of Minnesota's natural resources by Minnesotans. The last two years we saw an estimated 30% increase in the number of boaters out on the lakes and this was mirrored in State Park attendance, county parks and even the Boundary Waters Wilderness.

Minnesotans are loving their beautiful outdoors and that is a very good thing.

Not only are more people getting outdoors to recreate, but the activities they pursue are broader and more diverse with burgeoning interest in bird watching, mushroom picking, snow shoeing, cross country skiing, hiking and other activities. This increase in users of our natural areas has come even as the numbers of hunters and anglers decrease.

Traditionally, much of the MN DNR budget for wildlife, fish stocking, and habitat projects has come from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. The decrease in these activities, combined with increased costs due to a host of factors, has put into question the DNR's ability to do its work into the future.

In every institution, budget drives focus. Already our lakes are underfunded. Every lake shore owner has gotten appeals for philanthropic giving to support Aquatic

Invasive Species programs, fish stocking, water quality projects and the like.

A study by Concordia College, Moorhead found that Lake Associations already contribute over \$6.25 million in charitable giving to support our lakes. As DNR budgets fall due to a decline in fishing license sales, more burden will fall on local revenue sources.

The MN DNR needs to hear from citizens as to what the future of the agency will be, how to fund their efforts on our behalf. This discussion will be ongoing and your engagement at this point will make a difference in finding a fair and productive outcome.

You can sign up for updates and see the discussion that is occurring. There is a space for you to ask a question or offer an opinion.

MLR will be participating in this ongoing discussion. We expect this will be central to the 2022 DNR Roundtable and to listening sessions across the state. So make your voice heard now. As things progress we will make sure to keep you informed.

Greetings from MAISRC!

Minnesota has seemingly countless lakes, rivers, and wetlands, and we each have our favorite. For me, it is Leech Lake, where my family has spent the summers since 1934. Although I was expecting it, finding the first adult zebra mussel this year was devastating. In addition, my young son found Eurasian watermilfoil, rusty crayfish, and mystery snails near our beach (with starry stonewort recently confirmed across the lake). He will grow up with a different lake than I remember, and a very different one from my great grandfather. This is just one lake, one of many, infested with aquatic invasive species.

Hope is not lost, however. I'm reminded and inspired by the oft-used quote from my son's other favorite 'Dr.'... "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not." —The Lorax, Dr. Seuss. I believe that with ambitious management, a committed public, and innovative research we can make things better.

The Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) was created in 2012 with the mission to develop research-based solutions to our aquatic invasive species problems and advance knowledge to inspire action by others. As of 2021, we are well on our way. This last year was highlighted by major scientific advancements and continued progress on critical lines of research. Our research teams have worked tirelessly in the field, lab, and at their computers to generate and analyze data that is informing evidence-based decisions from the end of your dock to the State Capitol. The incremental steps are making a difference, leading to big wins, and eventually solutions for the seemingly impossible problems in front of us.

I have long been an advocate for team science – everyone is smarter than anyone. I am encouraged by the interdisciplinarity of our research teams, their willingness to think outside the box, and active engagement with managers and other stakeholders at every step in the process. This 'co-creation of research' has (and will!) improve the process from asking the right question to implementing the results. We acknowledge, however, that not everyone is at the table and are working to bring diverse perspectives into the conversations. I am looking forward to building on existing partnerships and creating new ones in the coming year.

On behalf of everyone at MAISRC, I would like to say "thank you!" to everyone that has supported us over the last year. We are all stretched thin, and your support means more now than it ever has. We are grateful to the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund and the Minnesota Legislature for their investments in sustaining MAISRC's research program. We are also thankful to the many lake associations, foundations, and individual donors for their generosity and commitment to finding research-based solutions to our aquatic invasive species problems. Lastly, we are thankful for the countless contributions of time, advice, advocacy, and words of encouragement. We are pursuing solutions together and could not do it without you.

The next year promises to be an exciting one and I look forward to seeing you all, in person, soon!

Refining and optimizing copper methods for zebra mussel suppression

Building off of previous work, MAISRC researchers set up a lakeside mobile laboratory at Pelican Lake in Crow Wing County to test the effects of different copper concentrations on zebra mussels and native species. They pumped lake water into the mobile lab and used the unique water chemistry metrics to predict the lowest effective dose for zebra mussel suppression. Researchers plan to validate the results and further refine recommendations with an in-lake trial at a different site in 2022.

Info from the Pelican River Watershed District:

The Sallie-Melissa Water Management Area is comprised of 11,400 acres, including Sallie and Melissa Lakes, the Pelican River (downstream of Little Detroit Lake), Ditch 14, and several small lakes called St. Clair, Muskrat, Mud, and Mill Pond. There are also numerous wetlands, many of which are associated with Ditch 14 and have been drained or partially drained.

There has been increased development pressure in this WMA. There is dense development surrounding Sallie and Melissa Lakes, with relatively small lots and extensive shoreline modifications. Little shoreline remains undeveloped, and in recent years, summer cottages have been converted to homes for year- round use. There is also residential development along the south side of Muskrat Lake and near the western shores of St. Clair Lake. Sallie and Melissa are the largest lakes in the Sallie-Melissa LWQMA, and together they account for about 90 percent of this WMA's surface water. Sallie and Melissa are relatively deep lakes and support important game fish opportunities and other recreational opportunities.

Water quality concerns in this WMA center around improving water quality in Lake Sallie and St. Clair. Lake Sallie is currently considered vulnerable to nutrient impairment, and experiences nuisance algae blooms most summers. Improving water quality in Sallie should also help water quality in Melissa because Sallie is just upstream of Melissa. Lake St. Clair is also listed as impaired by the MPCA for excess nutrients and has an approved TMDL. St. Clair's poor water quality is largely the result of its use as a receiving pond for partially treated sewage effluent for over 50 years. Thick, phosphorus-enriched sediments in St. Clair release phosphorus to the water column and cause severe algae blooms. An alum treatment in 1998 reduced phosphorus loading from to the lake, but after 20 years, the effectiveness of the alum treatment may be waning, as phosphorus concentrations are increasing back to impairment levels.

Aquatic invasive species are another big issue in the Sallie-Melissa WMA, particularly in Sallie, Melissa and Muskrat Lakes.

Emails and Facebook posts will notify owners of treatment dates for flowering rush as we are made aware.

Did you Know? Minnesota Statute 169.21 Subdivision 5 states that pedestrians walking along a roadway "shall, when practicable, walk or move on the left side of the roadway or its shoulder giving way to oncoming traffic". **Walk in the direction to face on-coming traffic so you can see the cars and stay safe!**
